NEW PROGRAMS, NEW DISCOVERIES

Over 100 years ago, John Burroughs spoke these powerful words, "I go to nature to be soothed and have my senses put in order." And, since arriving on Falls Road in 2003, HopeWell staff has been eagerly awaiting the day when we, too, could share the gift of nature with our community.

This dream became an attainable goal last year when we received four, special tribute gifts. Through the collective generosity of over 250 people, we were able to build the Firefly Meadow, a Butterfly Garden, the Kids Wall and add the beautiful wooden furniture to the patio behind the Barn.

HopeWell's Program staff quickly put these new resources to use. "Time spent outdoors can be both soothing *and* restorative. We now have a whole new area for our participants to explore," says Program Director Carole Sharp, referring to the 8 acres of forest and meadow behind HopeWell. "We know that nature can provide a multitude of extraordinary, reaffirming and renewing experiences. Our job was to create programs that allowed our community to enjoy our grounds in a safe and structured way."

New programs have been added such as Backyard Birding (shown above, right) and nature walks. Mindfulness Meditation and Kids Circle/Teen Circle have spent time outside, walking and playing.

We were happy to learn that a long-time "friend of HopeWell" is also an expert naturalist! Yoga brings together families living with cancer

CHILDREN, TEENS AND PARENTS LEARN TO BREATHE AGAIN... AS ONE

Our Kids Circle/Teen Circle program piloted a new approach this past year... one that allowed families coping with cancer to communicate and connect without saying a word.

As the class begins, HopeWell instructor Sharon Calvano LCSW-C and Kids Circle Facilitator Shondra Cowling, LCSW-C meet with the adults and children separately. Adults talk about the benefits of yoga for children and how they can use breathing to lower stress. Meanwhile the children and teens do an exercise to learn about benefits of breathing.



Then the families get back together for a series of yoga poses and mindfulness meditation exercises. This process has proved to be an effective way for adults, teens and children alike to slow down their bodies and minds and recognize the presence of stress. Breathing exercises — some done back-to-back — allow families to reduce stress by breathing together.

Instructor Sharon Calvano explains why the Family Yoga classes are particularly well-suited for families coping with cancer. "Families living with cancer really need a full array of communication skills, both verbal and non-verbal. This mini practice gives children and teens real tools that travel with them wherever they go. They might be waiting for Mom or Dad's next scan results or preparing for a test at school. They know how to center themselves, breathe and lower their stress level and they understand why that works."

A Letter from HopeWell

Dear Friends,

This has been a summer of unexpected natural occurrences—an earthquake, a hurricane and a LOT of rain. The surprising motion of the earth beneath our feet came “out of the blue.”

Hurricane Irene arrived with forewarning and thus, perhaps, with less anxiety. And the rains...well, if you didn't understand “standing water” and the aerodynamics of driving through it, there were unhappy consequences.

As I thought through our collective experiences and listened to people's reactions, it felt like an appropriate analogy to the daily conversations at HopeWell.

Like an earthquake, most diagnoses come in a life-shattering moment with three little words “You have cancer.” There is life before and life after, but never life-the-same.

The experience of post-diagnosis, pre-treatment cancer can feel more like the anticipation we all shared of the hurricane that was coming. We had a small window of time to put things in order and prepare for the storm ahead.

The endless rains were more akin to the long duration of some treatments... seemingly unrelenting, of unpredicted duration, more drenching than we'd hoped for, and with definite detours along the way.

Today the sun is shining, the skies are clear and the weather memories are fading.

But for most people with cancer, it isn't a matter of a few moments or weeks or months. The “quake” that upsets their routine and spins into motion as a storm, is life-changing and often life-threatening.

At HopeWell we believe that experiencing cancer with the support of a community of understanding surrounding you, makes it more likely you'll feel less “at sea.”

HopeWell has been providing a place of comfort, education and hope for over 18 years. We have learned a lot, grown a lot and, we hope, been responsive to the needs of the people in our midst who are dealing with cancer, the individuals and families whom we serve.

It continues to amaze people that we are able to provide all of this—a rich and varied calendar of programs in our own special setting—to some 1000 people annually for less than a million dollars. It continues to challenge us to ensure that our Annual Fund goals are met.

We have to push forward. We believe we can. And never before have our loyal donors and friends been more important to us and to those we serve.

Imagine going through an earthquake, a hurricane, a flood, alone and without support. Imagine how much greater your anxiety might have been.

So it is when faced with cancer. To go it alone without support can make this life altering experience seem that much more overwhelming. Having a community like HopeWell—with whom to share the burden and where one can find support and hope—can make all the difference in the world. After all, it helps to have even a small umbrella during a storm.



Just show up...

FELICIA'S TAKE ON LIFE WITH CANCER

In early September, as she was healing from surgery, Felicia Ho began to feel a bit better... stronger and more positive. Then, on September 8, she received some bad news on a pathology report. Not realizing the timing, we called to interview her for this column the very next day.

“I was feeling like I was on top of the world and then this news came in. My cancer is still active even after undergoing 4 months of chemo and major surgery. I'm not in a good place right now.”

As we talked a bit more, Felicia told us what went through her mind when we called. “I was on the phone with a friend who was offering support, and I saw the call come in from HopeWell. In the past, I might not have taken the call because I am not in a very positive place right now. But with cancer, I have learned that is it OK, sometimes, to just show up. I don't need to know what I will say. And, I don't need

She continued, “I am so grateful for HopeWell... I can't even find the right words. It is like Disneyland for cancer patients. It is my Holy Grail.”

Felicia so appreciated our call and mentioned again, how honored she is that we want to tell her story. “Amidst all the darkness in my life right now, HopeWell is a light. This newsletter story is a light. And even the smallest light lights a dark room.”



Helping to shape HopeWell's future

A Q&A SESSION WITH PETER ROSENWALD, HOPEWELL BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Peter Rosenwald likes to jokingly say he was over 6' feet tall when he was first introduced to HopeWell. A decade later, Peter is proud of the role he has played in helping to strengthen HopeWell's capacity to help people in Baltimore, even if it has cost him a few inches!

Q: How did you connect with HopeWell? I was recruited to join the HopeWell Board by my good friend Wendy Ginsburg. It was right around the time that my wife, Cynnie, was diagnosed with breast cancer. Wendy happened to catch me at a time where I was not sitting on any other Boards and the core pursuit of HopeWell—providing support to individuals and families coping with cancer—was something that really resonated with me.

Q: What about HopeWell has held your interest for over a decade? There have been many things along the way... everything from moving the programs here to Falls Road from Towson, to building the Barn, doing long-term strategic planning, and more. Being part of "growing" this organization has offered me the chance to work on important and interesting projects.

My involvement is generally on the financial end of things. No one likes fundraising but it must be done. As I see it, my primary responsibility as a Board member is to bring in funds to pay for HopeWell's programs, ensuring that we can continue to offer them at no cost. I also enjoy the idea that I am helping to position HopeWell for the future.

Q: Why do you think HopeWell matters to Baltimore?

Even beyond Baltimore... there is not another place in the country where people with cancer can access this caliber of programs and services. The setting here at HopeWell is so unique. It is completely different than the hospitals where people with cancer spend so much time.

Our programs are effective. We serve almost 1,000 people each year, and provide services that simply can't be found anywhere else. Participants tell us often how much they appreciate the organization.

HopeWell is a resource that Baltimore should be proud of, yet I worry that we are also one of its best-kept secrets. "Seeing is believing," is one of my favorite sayings. Come out and see for yourself what goes on here.

I have learned so much by listening to HopeWell participants speak. Every time I hear what this place means to those who benefit from the services, that makes everything worthwhile. That is my reward.

Prostate Cancer Connection

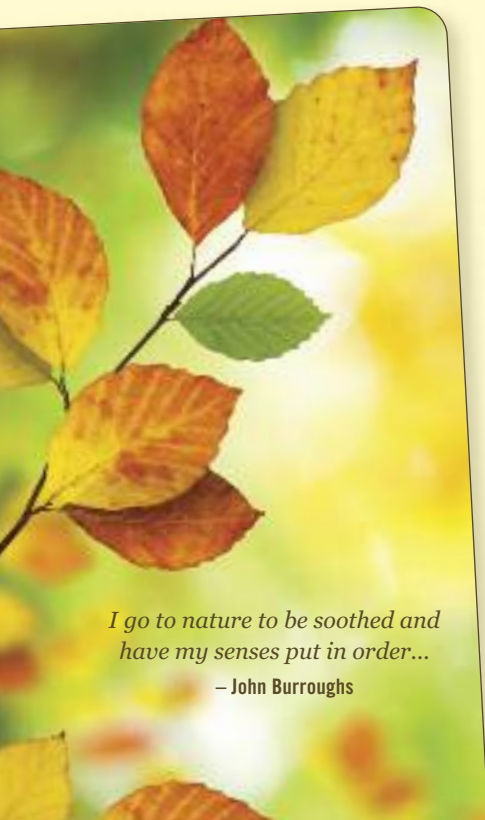
Facilitator: Jeff Klug, LCPC

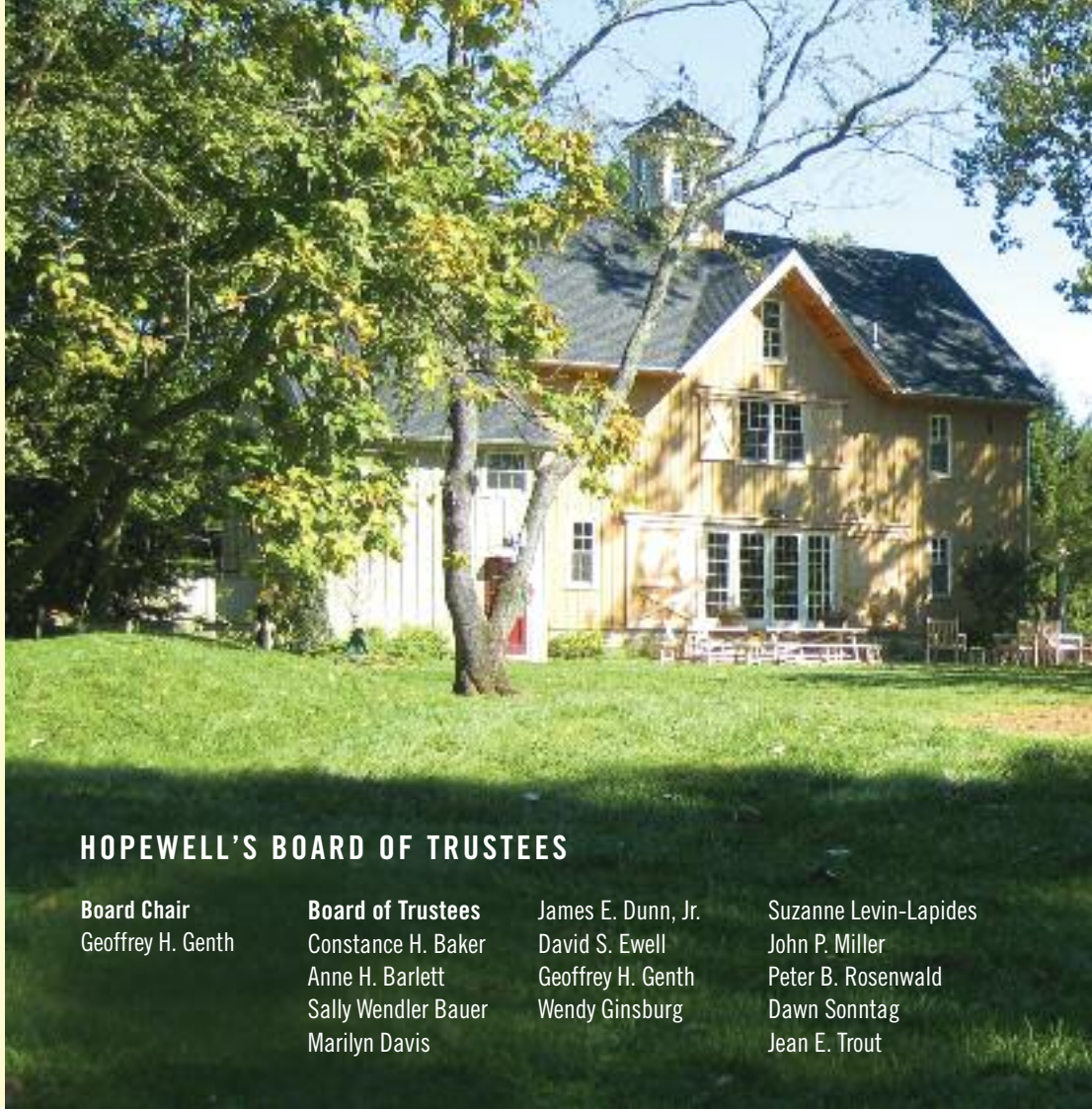
Tribute Cards are a beautiful way to make a gift in honor or in memory of someone special.

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in the news...

How HopeWell helps with headlines

News headlines can greatly impact people with cancer. The tease of the bold statements may mention a promising treatment that instantly raises hope and expectations. Reading further, however, one discovers it is only being used in the laboratory on mice—hopes dashed! But taking in this information—offered in print and online journalism—can be confusing and emotionally draining.

How do we know what to believe, what action to take, and how to discover the truth as it relates to us?

Whatever the headline, it can be jarring to read unless and until one truly understands the larger story, the source of information and how it relates to one's specific situation. Rarely do headlines alter the immediate course of one's life—but what is one to do with the information—information that you might seek, or information that others point out to you?

For example, there has been a series of articles in the *New York Times* in recent months noting the increased shortage of many types of drugs over the past 5 years. Some of these are drugs that have traditionally been available for cancer treatment. After many previous headlines addressing this shortage, a piece in the *New York Times* Opinion section by ethicist Ezekiel J. Emanuel, published on August 6, 2011, was headlined "Shortchanging Cancer Patients." And, at HopeWell it was a topic of conversation.

If you are sitting at home alone reading the headlines, what do you do with the information and the subsequent questions raised?

Contact HopeWell! Get involved with others who share similar concerns and questions.

HopeWell has always strived to be a safe and comfortable place for people to come and discuss their fears and anxiety in a supportive

atmosphere with other participants and experienced, professional staff. In **Participant Support Groups** and **Networking Groups** at HopeWell, participants talk openly about such headline topics. People learn how to get answers to questions and how to better navigate the news.

HopeWell's **House Calls Speaker Series** is designed to help address the issues that specifically affect people with cancer and their families. Experts from all areas of the medical community, with broad experience and expertise, come to HopeWell monthly to offer topics of interest in an informal, conversational setting. It is a place where "headlines" can be addressed and are put into a more understandable and helpful context.

WELLWISHERS AL & ILEAN FRIEDMAN SHARE THEIR STORY.



Al and Ilean have been coming to HopeWell almost as long as there has been a special group of annual fund donors we call WellWishers.

When Ilean was diagnosed with her first cancer, she and Al came to classes and speaker presentations to learn as much as they could in order to help navigate the “new normal” in their lives. Since those early years, each has had their own physical challenges, but HopeWell has remained an important part of “being well... feeling well.” And, in turn, they have become a regular fixture in HopeWell’s family.

Coming weekly to their yoga and exercise classes, for many years Al and Ilean gave to HopeWell occasionally – most often at the end of the year, a time when HopeWell receives almost 75% of its annual income. We were touched by their gifts, always, and the gratitude was mutual... they were grateful for HopeWell and what it offered them. In looking back, Al admits that “we really didn’t know how HopeWell was funded, we were just glad you were available.”

Last year, when HopeWell began to make the community more aware of our funding sources and our increasing funding needs, Al and Ilean “noticed!”

As Al said in a recent conversation, “I knew that HopeWell offered all of its programs at no charge to people who come here... but I also know from age and experience, that nothing is free! I did

wonder now and then where the funding came from, but it was something I took for granted.”

“When I first saw the pegboard outside the door and read the newsletter where HopeWell explained the challenges of growing programs in a difficult economy – the light bulb went on! Ilean and I talked about it and made an appointment to learn more from Suzanne about HopeWell’s funding needs.”

“We decided to give monthly because it is easier for us now that we are both retired. And, all of a sudden, I found out that our monthly gifts added up and made us part of the WellWishers Circle!” The Friedmans, coincidentally, were the first members of HopeWell’s monthly giving program called CORE.

The WellWishers Circle came into being to attract and recognize donors who give annually at the \$1000 and above level. People who know Al, know that he isn’t impressed by titles or “gimmicks” but being a part of the core of regular gifts that make it possible for HopeWell to thrive, being a WellWisher, made him pleased.

Al and Ilean both credit HopeWell for keeping them feeling positive and healthy well into their 80s.

“Hospitals make you feel better, and we pay for that. HopeWell does the same thing, so I give what I can. Donating to such a great charity makes me feel like I’m giving back.”

Certainly not everyone can become a WellWisher, but for those who do, HopeWell extends its deepest gratitude for your commitment of support... support that is, indeed, selfless.

Not By Chance...

HOW VALUES SHAPE THE HOPEWELL EXPERIENCE

People facing every type of cancer, from all over central Maryland, come to HopeWell to recover their strength, learn with others and renew their spirits. Participants—whether the person diagnosed with cancer or a family member—consistently say they are better able to handle the experience of cancer after coming to HopeWell.

How do our programs foster inner strength, coping skills and a new level of hopefulness? Not by chance, as it might at first seem in our relaxed and welcoming atmosphere, but by the thoughtful and continual refining of programs and leadership practices that reflect HopeWell's key beliefs.

- **Being happy in life begins with feeling safe.** The injury and threats that cancer brings to the body do not have to leave us feeling permanently insecure. HopeWell is, by design, a warm, home-like setting where staff and volunteers concentrate on creating an environment to help participants feel safe, secure and comfortable every day.
- **A wide range of perspectives helps.** We believe that diversity of gender, age, race, ethnicity, varied economic circumstances, and type of disease brings a wealth of viewpoints and sense of balance for dealing with cancer and with life. We value inclusiveness and welcome each new person to our community with acceptance and respect. Our door is open to anyone whose life is touched by cancer.
- **Listening openly to others and to ourselves is the key** to awareness, empathy, widening perspective, and deep compassion. In a HopeWell group, the new member finds their place in the circle and is changed by their experience in the group. In turn, the group, as it makes room for and embraces the newcomer, is also changed. These changes articulate and refine HopeWell's culture of hope, connection and generosity.
- **People do not have to face their experience of cancer alone.** We believe that in a setting of trust, respect and confidentiality, where each person's perspective is fully appreciated, participants will be able to communicate with comfort, confidence and candor, and will benefit from the wisdom, courage, experience and determination of others.
- **The most important truths lie within.** HopeWell staff members are professionals who understand that cancer is an individual journey and that it takes time, patience and courage to find one's own true voice, and to be able to truly hear and honor the experiences of fellow survivors. This process of discovery allows us all to appreciate the special gifts of others, see beauty in the world and find strength in the support of the HopeWell community.
- **Each member of HopeWell plays a valuable role and has something unique to offer.** We are an independent community made up of people with cancer, their families and friends, staff, board, volunteers, healthcare professionals and donors. We work together as equals to ensure that people are not alone in their journey with cancer. In our community, hope is discovered, redefined and sustained. Hope is the result of coming together in community. **Hope is the gift of HopeWell...**
